General Local Elections

- Low voter turnout for local elections
 - 2015 federal election → 68.3%
 - 2017 provincial election → 57.7%
 - 2014 B.C. local elections → 44.%

- However, your vote is one in hundreds in local elections
 - In provincial and federal elections, your vote is one of *millions*



General Local Elections

CHANGING LANDSCAPE

- High turn over: Only 8 of the region's 21 mayors are seeking re-election
- In 2014, 16 mayors campaigned to keep their jobs (14 won)
- Long standing mayors leaving office:
 - Mayor Gregor Robertson, City of Vancouver (10 years)
 - Mayor Greg Moore, City of Port Coquitlam (10 years)
 - Mayor Darell Mussatto, City of North Vancouver (12 years)
 - Mayor Richard Walton, District of North Vancouver (13 years)
 - Mayor Lois Jackson, Delta (19 years)


2018 METRO VANCOUVER MUNICIPAL ELECTION SURVEY


VoteLocal Survey – Key Findings


SURVEY: Has your business' ability to recruit or retain employees been affected by the cost of housing?


SURVEY: Have you recently considered moving away from the Metro Vancouver region due to quality of life or affordability concerns?



RECOMMENDATIONS

- Increasing density in metropolitan areas,
- Increasing **diversity** in housing stock (i.e. build a variety of housing types such as condos, town houses, lane way houses, etc.),
- Pre-zone for transit oriented development,
- Reduce development timelines through concurrent reviews of different stages.





SURVEY: Should local governments work with the Provincial Government to allow ridesharing (e.g. Uber or Lyft)?






RECOMMENDATIONS

- Develop and maintain necessary gateway infrastructure;
- Protect industrial land; and
- Develop a region-wide land use strategy with an inventory of industrial land.

SERVICE DELIVERY ISSUES

- Political borders of local governments rarely coincide with a region's economic or social boundaries:
 - often leads to a mismatch between where people pay taxes and where they benefit from local government services and infrastructure
- Fostering inter-municipal cooperation is difficult:
 - o governments are reluctant to subsidize another municipality's services



Regional Coordination and Governance

HIGH-LEVEL OBSERVATIONS (Economic Scorecard 2018)

- Two unique regional bodies:
 - Metro Vancouver
 - TransLink
- Regional issues clearly persist:
 - Housing affordability
 - Industrial land scarcity
 - Transportation
 - Policing
 - Economic development



Regional Coordination and Governance

BEST PRACTICES (Economic Scorecard 2018)

If attempts of regional governance reform are made, they should reflect these best practices:

- 1. Voluntary to maintain focus and increase flexibility
- 2. Decentralized when appropriate to maintain local government autonomy and keep decision-making close to constituents
- 3. Private sector outsourcing and private-public partnerships, but only when there is sufficient competition
- 4. Higher levels of government act to support and augment collaboration and cooperation between municipalities


IDEAS FOR REGIONAL IMPROVEMENT (Economic Scorecard 2018)

- Directly Elect Metro Vancouver's Board
- Centralize Economic Development and Investment Promotion
- Increase Inter-Municipal Cooperation Agreements & Private-Sector Provision (e.g. fully implement mobile business licenses)
