



'20 Provincial Election Members' Survey Results

Introduction

The Greater Vancouver Board of Trade with assistance by Mustel Group has conducted a survey among its members to measure opinions on various election issues of relevance to members, and the performance of the current provincial government. A total of 367 members completed the survey from September 24th to 30th, 2020.

Key Findings


COVID Impacts on Businesses

- Approximately **one-in-four businesses (26%) do** *not* **expect to survive more than 12 months** under current conditions if economic conditions do not improve.
- But the majority (89%) feel at least somewhat prepared for potential future waves of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Once the B.C. Government stops deferring taxes and/or requires business to pay deferred tax, **only four-in-ten expect to return to business as usual**. The remainder expect to:
 - Continue operating at reduced capacity (26%)
 - Layoff employees (17%)
 - o Reduce employee work hours (17%)
 - Take on debt/loan (16%)
 - Temporarily or permanently close (4%)

Election and Recovery Priorities


• The **most important issue for members in the 2020 B.C. Election is economic recovery**, followed at distance by a number of other issues.

Most Important Election Issue




• Overall, opinions are mixed regarding whether the current B.C. Government is currently on the right track (39%) or wrong track (35%).

B.C. Government on Right/Wrong Track



• When looking at the economy specifically, the majority believe the B.C. Government is on the wrong track to ensure the long-term competitiveness of Greater Vancouver.


Long Term Competitiveness



- Increase in the **cost of regulations, compliance, taxes, and fees** affecting businesses may be part of the reason, reported by over 60% of businesses (in comparison to 5% reporting they have decreased since 2017).
- **Lack of collaboration** among the different levels of government to support the economy in Greater Vancouver may be another reason (74% do not believe governments are collaborating effectively).

- Members have suggested a number of measures for economic recovery but believe the B.C. Government should prioritize the following:
 - Creating better/more competitive conditions for investment in the province
 - o Reducing the administrative burden or making regulations more efficient
 - Providing business with financial support (e.g. payroll/wage supports, providing capital or reducing taxes and fees)
 - Investing in technology and innovation to boost productivity and economic activity
 - o Funding for large transportation infrastructure projects (e.g. roads, bridges, trade enabling projects)


Priorities for Economic Recovery Measures



- **Direct business support measures** that are the most important for business survival and recovery that businesses believe should be prioritized by the B.C. Government are:
 - o Reducing or making regulations more efficient, cutting red tape (45%)
 - Support sectors that are positive economic multipliers for the region and province e.g. tourism and travel (38%)
 - Reduced fees for business (33%)
 - o Reducing or eliminating the Provincial Sales Tax (32%)
 - Providing business with payroll/wage supports (31%)
 - Reducing commercial property taxes (30%)

- Between 40-64% of members would also like to see the B.C. Government do more on a number of issues with more action particularly sought on:
 - Providing vision for Greater Vancouver's economy
 - Availability and affordability of housing
 - Reducing permitting processes in municipalities

Government Doing Enough on Issues



Major Infrastructure Projects

- In term of major infrastructure projects, 55% to 62% believe the B.C. Government should do more to:
 - o prioritize new investments in transportation and infrastructure projects (62%);
 - o **improve regulatory processes** to support major projects (61%); and
 - o increase **trade-enabling infrastructure** in BC (55%).
- Members tend to support the decision to:
 - o extend the **Millennium Line** to UBC (82% support, 13% oppose);
 - o the urban transit gondola to Simon Fraser University (54% support, 26% oppose, 20% unsure); and
 - believe the BC Government should work with local governments and communities to pursue mobility pricing (54% support, 33% oppose, 13% unsure).
- However, they do not support how the Province has approached the building/planning of the George Massey Crossing Project (52% not in support versus 20% in support, 28% unsure).
- With respect to energy and natural resources, there is strong support (86%) for the B.C. Government to pursue the responsible development of B.C. 's energy and natural resources.


Work from Home

- Businesses appear to be approaching an employee crisis. Since the onset of COVID-19, businesses have observed:
 - Increased mental health concerns among employees (reported by 60% of members)
 - Lonely employees/ feeling disconnected (reported by 54% versus 10% happier/more content employees)
 - Less productive employees (38% versus 24% more productive)

BC Recovery Plan

- Over seven-in-ten of businesses are aware of the B.C. Government's Economic Recovery Plan.
- Among those aware of the plan and with an opinion, **two-thirds are** *not* **confident that this plan will help the overall economic recovery** of their business through the COVID period and any potential future waves.

When members were asked for suggestion of actions the next provincial government should take to support the
business community, suggestions echoed many of the findings in the research and included: reducing taxes (i.e.
property taxes, no new taxes), offering various business supports (i.e. interest free loans, training and
education), reducing regulations/ bureaucracy/ fees, investing in specific business sectors, and infrastructure
investment.
